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# Sheriff Honors Exemplary Employees

At the end of last month, 33 men and women from the Sheriff's Department were presented with some of the highest honors which can be conferred by the Department. Twenty-one of those honorees were recognized for a single, record-setting incident.

A report last July of found illegal explosives in an Anaheim storage yard resulted in the largest amount of high and low grade explosives ever seized by the Orange County Bomb Squad. The owners of the storage vard were in the process of taking possession of the semi-truck due to non-payment of storage fees, but when they opened the trailer they discovered what they believed to be dangerous explosives and they called the Anaheim Police Department which, in turn, contacted the Sheriff's Department Bomb Squad.

A coordinated effort was initiated with the Anaheim Fire Department Haz-Mat Unit and the Anaheim Police Department, and the area was evacuated. The July heat added to the potential danger of the situation. Over the course of the next



three days, numerous members of the Bomb Squad were required to work around the clock with overlapping shifts of at least 12 hours. Nearly 900 man-hours were logged during the 72-hour operation.

Because of explosive and inhalation dangers, personnel were required to wear blast vests, helmets with face shields, breathing apparatus and filtration masks.

The contents of the semi included 800 pounds of illegal

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organization. We have asked County agency/department heads to take a good look at succession planning within their organizations. Here are some of the things we've done.

We are now in the fifth class of the Orange County Leadership Academy which we co-sponsor with Chapman University. During each session, 30-plus County managers are nominated by their department heads to participate in this intensive course that explores leadership theory, communication and team-building. Participants have come away from the experience saying that they received information and skills that they could immediately put to use in their workdays.

Department heads were also asked about two years ago to develop a succession plan for their departments and to identify promotable individuals as well as outline training experiences for them.

We have our eyes to the future, and we're actively trying to "build the bench" with talented, dedicated men and women who are ready to step into leadership roles in County government.

## Volunteers Give More Than One Million Hours of Service



#### **Patty Murray**

This year marks the 16th anniversary for John Wayne Airport's (JWA) Tour Program, just as Patty Murray completes her 16 years as a volunteer tour guide at JWA.

As an accomplished pilot herself, Murray leads tours through the airport to educate community members about the airport's history and the many interesting aspects of the terminal. Her aviation background adds hands on information and a pilot's flare to the informative tours she leads.

Going above and beyond her regular guided tours, Murray also recently hosted an event at JWA for dozens of local Girl Scouts. This event offered several activities and programs to provide the opportunity for the girls to complete the needed requirements for their aviation badge.

Murray received her pilot's license in 1966 and has nearly 3,000 hours of total flying time. She is among the elite few to hold an Airline Transport Pilot license, of which only five percent are women.

In addition to being among the few women to hold this license, Murray is also a member and past chair of the local chapter of the Ninety Nines (an international organization of women pilots). She has also flown in several air races and participated in the Young Eagles Program.


#### Mike Barboza

When a large brush fire broke out in Irvine Regional Park in June 2004, Harbors, Beaches & Parks was fortunate enough to have Reserve Park Ranger Mike Barboza on duty. While the fire

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quickly burned, Barboza provided critical leadership in directing fire crews and equipment to the correct area of the park and in organizing the evacuation of a large number of park visitors including several elderly people. With the help from Barboza's composed leadership throughout the emergency, the fire was quickly extinguished with minimal risk to visitors.

The County has benefited from Barboza's efforts since spring of 2003 when he started with the Orange County Park Ranger Reserve Program. Barboza has volunteered an impressive 1,000 hours of service over the last three years and Harbors, Beaches & Parks recently selected him as their 2005 Reserve Ranger of the Year.



In February, Barboza graduated from the Orange County Sheriff's Academy and earned his Peace Officer Standards and Training Level III certification.

Every Sunday morning, the married couple climbs into their car and begins the long stretch of road connecting Nevada to Orange County. They arrive at Probation's Youth Guidance Center (YGC) for an evening tutoring session just before 6 p.m., stay in a local hotel overnight, and return home on Mondays.

At the YGC, Ifju and Toth tutor approximately 15 minors in subjects ranging from math to history. The couple's diligence helps prepare the YGC youths to take their General Education Development tests and California High School Exit Exams. The youths at YGC are considered at-risk for drug/alcohol-related problems, and the opportunity to earn the equivalent of a high school diploma is an essential step in turning their lives around.

As an added bonus to the minors, Ifju is also a professional hairstylist and offers haircuts in addition to tutoring. The haircuts are a great way to build confidence and self-esteem in young people. It also helps develop the bond between pupil and tutor.

## **Employees Encouraged As Election Volunteers**

County employees can take part in the election process by volunteering as poll workers in the upcoming elections. Read the details below and sign up online. If you have questions, please contact Registrar of Voters' staff at 714.567.5106. To sign up, go to: http://pollworker.ocgov.com

### Eligibility

- Must be registered to vote in California
- Must be able to read and speak English
- Must be able to work from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Election Day
- Must complete training

### What would you do?

Assist with set-up and ad-

ministration of polling sites as a Clerk or Inspector

- Direct sign-in and verify signatures for voters
- Explain procedures and answer voters' questions
- Assist voters in operating the electronic eSlate voting machine, or applicable voting system
- Assist with closing the polls at the end of Election Day
- The ROV will attempt to place you close to your home in Orange County.

### Training

- A training session is required for all poll workers. County employees may attend during the regular workday or after hours. ROV staff will contact you with scheduling options.
- County poll workers will receive the same training as other poll workers so that the training is consistent, and each poll worker is able to perform all tasks.

#### Compensation

In addition to your normal day's (eight hours) pay, you will receive:

• A stipend of \$20 to complete required training

- A stipend of \$50 to serve as a Clerk
- A stipend of \$70 to serve as an Inspector. Plus \$10 to pick up supplies
- A stipend of \$70 plus mileage to serve as a Coordinator or on the A-Team.

In compliance with the IRS, the Auditor's office will add your election service pay to your regular paycheck.

### Deadlines

- County poll workers should sign up as soon as possible to ensure adequate time for training.
- The stipend will be on your paycheck four to six weeks after Election Day.
